UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENTS

H.R. 3979 (ORDER NO. 333)

1.—Ordered, That upon the conclusion of Morning Business, the Senate resume consideration of H.R. 3979, an Act to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to ensure that emergency services volunteers are not taken into account as employees under the shared responsibility requirements contained in the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act; provided that with respect to the cloture motions filed on the bill and on Amdt. No. 2874, the mandatory quorum calls under Rule XXII be waived. (*Mar. 31, 2014.*)

S. 1845 (ORDER NO. 265)

2.—Ordered, That with respect to the cloture motions filed on February 4, 2014, the filing deadline for first degree amendments to S. 1845, a bill to provide for the extension of certain unemployment benefits, and for other purposes, be 9:45 a.m. on Thursday, February 6, 2014, and the filing deadline for second degree amendments to Amdt. No. 2714 and S. 1845 be 10:45 a.m. on Thursday, February 6, 2014; provided, that with respect to those cloture motions, the mandatory quorums required under Rule XXII be waived, and that Wednesday, February 5, 2014, count as an intervening day for the purposes of Rule XXII.

Ordered further, That with respect to the cloture motion filed on January 9, 2014, the filing deadline for first degree amendments to S. 1845 be 3:00 p.m. on Monday, January 13, 2014, and the filing deadline for second degree amendments to S. 1845 be 11:00 a.m. on Tuesday, January 14, 2014; provided, that with respect to that cloture motion, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (Jan. 9, 13, Feb. 4, 2014.)

S. 1197 (ORDER NO. 91)

3.—Ordered, That with respect to the cloture motion on S. 1197, an original bill to authorize appropriations for fiscal year 2014 for military activities of the Department of Defense, for military construction, and for defense activities of the Department of Energy, to prescribe military personnel strengths for such fiscal year, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived.

Ordered further, That the filing deadline for first degree amendments be 1:00 p.m. and that the filing deadline for second degree amendments be 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, November 21, 2013. (Nov. 20, 2013.)

S. CON. RES. 8

4.—Ordered, That with respect to the conference on S. Con. Res. 8 an original concurrent resolution setting forth the congressional budget for the United States Government for fiscal year 2014, revising the appropriate budgetary levels for fiscal year 2013, and setting forth the appropriate budgetary levels for fiscal years 2015 through 2023, the conferences on the part of the Senate are instructed to report back a conference report by December 13, 2013.

Ordered further, That it not be in order for the Senate to consider a conference report with respect to H. Con. Res. 25 or S. Con. Res. 8 if it includes reconciliation instructions to raise the debt limit. (Oct. 16, 2013.)

S. 1569 (ORDER NO. 211)

5.—Ordered, That with respect to the cloture motion filed on the motion to proceed to S. 1569, a bill to ensure the complete and timely payment of the obligations of the United States Government until December 31, 2014, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (Oct. 10, 2013.)

S. 1392 (ORDER NO. 154)

6.—Ordered, That with respect to S. 1392, a bill to promote energy savings in residential buildings and industry, and for other purposes; no amendments or motions be in order relative to Syria or the use of military force during consideration of the bill. (Sept. 11, 2013.)

S. 1243 (ORDER NO. 99)

7.—Ordered, That the text of H.R. 2610, as reported by the House Appropriations Committee, be deemed House-passed text for the purposes of Rule XVI for S. 1243, an original bill making appropriations for the Departments of Transportation, and Housing and Urban Development, and related agencies for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2014, and for other purposes.

2014, and for other purposes. Ordered further, That the filing deadline for first degree amendments be 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday, July 31, 2013 and the filing deadline for second degree amendments be 11:00 a.m. on Thursday, August 1, 2013.

Ordered further, That with respect to the cloture motion filed on S. 1243, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (July 18, 31, 2013.)

S. 1238 (ORDER NO. 124)

8.—Ordered, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 1238, a bill to amend the Higher Education Act of 1965 to extend the current reduced interest rate for undergraduate Federal Direct Stafford Loans for 1 year, to modify required distribution rules for pension plans, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (July 8, 2013.)
