#### UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENT

#### S. 1251 (CALENDAR NO. 74)


1.—Ordered, That on Thursday, June 24, 2021, following the conclusion of Morning Business, the Senate proceed to the consideration of S. 1251, a bill to authorize the Secretary of Agriculture to develop a program to reduce barriers to entry for farmers, ranchers, and private forest landowners in certain voluntary markets, and for other purposes; provided, that the only amendment in order be Amdt. No. 2119, to be offered by the Senator from Utah (Mr. Lee); provided further, that all time on the bill expire at 11:00 a.m. and that there be two minutes for debate, equally divided, prior to each vote; further, that upon the use or yielding back of time, the Senate vote on the Lee amendment; provided further, that the bill be considered read a third time and the Senate vote on passage of the bill, as amended, if amended; further, that the motions to reconsider be considered made and laid upon the table, with no intervening action or debate.
